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Exploring career options involves researching **occupations** and **industry sectors** that fit your **skills**, interests, personality preferences and values. An *occupation* relates to the activities of the work you perform, whereas *industry sector* classifies the organizations that employ people in such occupations.

Example: Training & Development Specialist" is an occupation that involves using learning strategies, critical thinking, judgment and decision making skills to design, plan, organize and direct orientation and training for employees or customers. Training and Development Specialists work in many industry sectors — particularly but not exclusively in the professional services sector. They might also work in the government, educational and information services sectors.

Management & Human Resources graduates have many skills. In particular, they can:

Analyze current and emerging situations
Coach managers regarding employee relations
Conduct employee orientations and programs
Deliver or support educational/learning initiatives
Formulate HR strategies to fit an organization

Lead teams and motivate employees
Promote integrity and customer service
Provide analytical and process support
Provide proactive human capital management
Understand workplace trends and conditions



With these skills in mind, how can I research my career options? Occupational Research

Canada's National Occupational Classification (NOC) system categorizes over 30,000 occupational titles into 10 broad classes listed in **Table 1**. The 4-digit titles in **Table 2** are examples of occupations related to Management & Human Resources within these classes (NB: Some require further education).
