It seeks to explain how society is ordered and disordered, what accounts for social cohesion, cooperation, and conflict and the causes of social inequality. Students acquire a diverse set of transferable skills. Students will learn to use theoretically informed and evidence-based arguments to assess concrete social problems.

HOW TO USE THIS PROGRAM PATHWAY

Read through each year; investigate what appeals to you here and in other Program Pathways that apply to you. Note that this Pathway is only a suggestion. **For the most up to date information, please check the UTSC Calendar.**

CHOOSE YOUR COURSES WISELY

- Take SOCA03Y3.
- Explore different types of courses; this will also help fulfill the breadth requirements and electives.
- Use Degree Explorer to plan your courses and program of interest.
- See the UTSC Calendar for course requirements.

- Complete the core courses comprised of 2.0 credits: SOCB05H3, SOCB35H3, SOCB42H3, and SOCB43H3.
- Apply for admission in the Sociology Major program.
- Meet with your Program Advisor to strategize for your degree.

- Refine your writing with 0.5 credit from designated Applied Writing Skills courses: SOCC03H3, SOCC11H3, SOCC23H3, SOCC24H3, SOCC30H3, SOCC31H3, SOCC34H3, SOCC40H3, SOCC47H3, SOCC58H3.
- 2.5 additional credits in SOC courses. Get hands on research experience with research practicums SOCC23H3 or SOCC31H3.

- 1.5 additional courses from C- or D-level.
- Delve deeper into specific specializations in Sociology.
- Use Degree Explorer to ensure you are on track to graduate.
- Register your Intent to Graduate on ACORN by the deadline.

DEVELOP YOUR ACADEMIC & RESEARCH SKILLS

- First year course SOCA03Y3 introduces students to the field of Sociology.
- We encourage you to meet your Program Librarian for in-depth research assistance with your assignments.
- Book sessions with CTL's Writing Center to develop academic and writing skills.
- Join Students of Sociology (SOS).

- Reach out to your Faculty members and inquire about research opportunities.
- Refine your interests in Sociology subfields.
- Explore the Sociology Research Guide.
- Attend workshops offered by the Academic Advising & Career Centre (AA&CC) and Centre for Teaching and Learning (CTL) to develop academic skills.

- Take a qualitative or quantitative research practicum course and carry out your own original research project.
- Join the Indigenous book club.
- Consider participating in the UTSC Undergraduate Research Symposium to showcase your work in an interdisciplinary setting.
- Consider competing for the UTSC Library Undergraduate Research Prize.

- Speak with a faculty member about possible Research Assistantships.
- Consider an independent research course.
- Attend or participate in the Sociology Undergraduate Research Day.
- Apply for an Academic Travel Fund through Department of Student Life (DSL) to research, present at a conference, or engage with the international academic community.

APPLY THEORY TO PRACTICE

- Attend the UTSC Faculty Mix & Mingle Fair to connect with professors and learn more about their specialties.
- Start building your Co-Curricular Record (CCR) and search for Experiential Learning opportunities on the Career & Co-Curricular Learning Network (CLNx).

- Look for Research Assistantships.
- Participate in the Indigenous book club.
- Connect with campus events.
- Attend the Summer & Full-time Job Fair in January to meet with potential employers looking to hire students for summer and full-time positions.
- Get involved in relevant opportunities on and/or off campus; apply to Work Study, or other jobs on CLNx.

- Submit a paper to the Sociology Undergraduate Research Day.
- Build on your skills and knowledge through relevant events offered through your department, student groups, DSL and the AA&CC.

- Explore summer internships or job opportunities in Sociology.
- Attend the Summer & Full-Time Job Fair in January to meet with potential employers looking to hire students for relevant summer and full-time positions.

BECOME AN ENGAGED CITIZEN (LOCALLY & GLOBALLY)

- Meet with the campus Indigenous Elder.
- Join Students of Sociology (SOS) and explore other relevant student clubs and activities on campus.
- Volunteer in DSL's Alternative Reading Week program to gain experience and knowledge about social change and community development; explore other DSL programs.

- Attend research seminars on campus and in the community.
- Check CLNx to search for Work Study or volunteer positions on campus to gain experience and to get involved.
- Join one of DSL's Community Action Projects to apply academic learning and take action for social change through engagement opportunities in the Scarborough community.

- Volunteer to be a First Year Peer Advisor in DSL's First Year Experience Program.
- Attend the UTSC Get Experience Fair to learn about local and international opportunities.
- Look into volunteering or working overseas to expand your network through the International Student Centre's (ISC) Global Learning programs.

- Participate in the AA&CC's Partners in Leadership program to learn and network with an alumni mentor about transitioning to work or further education.
- Use CLNx to search for Internships.

PLAN FOR YOUR FUTURE CAREER

- Volunteer with organizations to explore your interests; check listings on CLNx.
- Attend the UTSC Get Experience Fair in September and register with SCSU's Volunteer Network Program to explore opportunities.

- Gain experience by applying for a summer, part-time or Work Study position via CLNx (>Jobs & Recruitment).
- Considering grad school? Speak to professors and program advisors early so you are on track.
- Explore careers through the AA&CC's Job Shadowing program and In The Field programs.

- Plan a career path with a staff member at the AA&CC.
- Check CLNx for networking events and employer information sessions.
- Attend the UTSC Graduate & Professional School Fair in September.
- Consider the AA&CC's Partners in Leadership program to learn and network with an alumni mentor about transitioning to work or further education.

- Attend the AA&CC's Get Hired job search conference in April/May.
- Attend the Jobs for Grads orientation for a job search "crash course". Find job opportunities on CLNx.
- If you are considering grad school, discuss your plans early with staff at the AA&CC and your professors.
- Get your Personal Statement reviewed in the AA&CC.
- If you are considering grad school, consider applying for a SSHRC award.
