Our students strengthen their knowledge in theory and methodological approaches with courses whose primary themes include power, knowledge, approaches to research, how gender impacts health, society, globalization, and development.

Their cross-disciplinary training enables our graduate students to provide significant contributions to a range of public and private organizations and institutions, such as those addressing policy analysis and development, education, marketing, social work, advocacy, equity and diversity, business, and law.

PROFILE : SARAH ELSAWY

When Sarah joined the HR team at the Department of National Defence (DND), her academic background was noticeably different from her peers. This wasn't necessarily a bad thing. As Sarah explains it, "My employers valued my intellectual capabilities and interpersonal skills. I was able to work on an array of projects that not only benefited my team but the entire organization itself."

As a member of the Recruitment and Diversity team, Sarah's role was to help the DND reach a more diverse audience through its employer marketing. As the majority of STEM roles currently belong to men, organizations such as DND aim to encourage women to apply to STEM positions, or to even consider the field altogether.

While working at the Department, Sarah drew from her academic pursuits to conduct research, communicate insights to her team members, and work collaboratively to design programs for the organization. In fact, these interpersonal and communication skills are among the reasons Sarah rejects the notion that Women's and Gender Studies students do not have "a specific area of expertise" that makes them competitive in the workforce. She credits a number of valuable hard skills in the workplace such as proposal writing, research, analysis, and presenting to the education received within the Women's and Gender Studies program.

With regards to the future of work, Sarah believes a Women's and Gender Studies education offers a powerful advantage; "As society is evolving and becoming more culturally aware and conscious, organizations and companies are following suit. This leads to an increase in hiring those who have unique expertise in these areas. Women's and Gender Studies are well-prepared to rise to the challenge".
